Students' Amnesty efforts commended by RE Head

Students who tried to prevent the execution of a man Amnesty International claimed was innocent have received praise from the College's Head of RE.

Troy Davis had spent 22 years on Death Row for the murder of security guard, Mark McPhail, in Georgia, USA, in 1989.

Davis lost his battle against execution on September 21 but had maintained his innocence throughout.

He claimed there was no physical evidence linking him to the crime, that seven of the nine non-police witnesses on whose evidence he was convicted had since recanted or contradicted their testimony, that many witnesses stated they were pressured or coerced by police and that nine individuals had signed affidavits implicating an alternative suspect.

On hearing about Davis' plight, a number of College students backed his campaign. Joe Harrison (10R) set up a Facebook page to encourage people to stop the killing.

Students also sent a petition to the Parole Board of Georgia, while others created a display which is featured in one of the College corridors. The College's Head of RE, Mr Moorhead, praised the students for their efforts. He said: "I was inspired by the way the students tried to stop an injustice. The case of Troy Davis makes you realise how dangerous the death penalty is."





Congratulations to Finn Keeble (7D) who has recently been awarded a Black Belt in Taekwondo. The Year 7 youngster has trained in the Korean martial art for five years and was delighted to be awarded the Black Belt last month.

He said: "I have been doing Taekwondo for five years. To get the Black Belt I had to perform ten moves, which are patterns and nine movements, known as step-sparring.

"I also had to do take-downs and flips as well as show my knowldege of Taekwondo by answering 25 questions.

"I was really happy to have passed and got the Black Belt."

Finn hopes to continue with the martial art and take it up professionally when he is older.
