Isabel, who attended the match at Marine's Rossett Park ground, saw Sacred Heart's 6th Formers take on staff past and present. Among the staff who took part was Mr Hurst. Here is his account of a wonderful afternoon: "The Sacred Heart community came out in their droves at Marine, in aid of Mrs Morison and her on-going battle with Grade 4 Glioblastoma.

"The day was a huge success with our 6th Formers taking on staff from both past and present.

"More than 500 spectators were treated to a brilliant display of attacking football

from the 6th Form team, as they romped in to a 3-0 half-time lead.

"Cue the introduction of Dylan Morison, and a complete turnaround in events which saw Isabel's son score a hat trick and walk away with the match ball and man of the match trophy.

### Comfortable

"The staff team, complete with super sub Dylan, ran out comfortable 7-3 winners. However, the real winners on the day were Isabel and her family Stuart, Dylan and Lucy.

"They continue to inspire everyone with their strength of character, positivity and courage despite having seen their lives turned upside down over the last six months.

"Sacred Heart, as a 'caring Christian Community', continue to stand side-by-side with Isabel and her family.

"With £25,000 already raised by our inspirational community and PTA, we continue to seek ways to raise the £200,000 needed that will allow Isabel to receive Immunotherapy - the revolutionary treatment which could help in her battle.

"As the day drew to a close, fans and players alike reflected on a day in which memories were made, goals were scored and, most importantly, an inspirational member of our College was given hope on her journey - one that everyone connected with Sacred Heart Catholic College is honoured to be a part of and will continue to be."

## Road Safety Time for Year 9



It was Green Cross Code time again last week, as our Year 9s were given a lesson in road safety.

But rather than Kevin Keegan stopping people from running out into the road from behind parked cars, our students were treated to a play from the touring theatre company, Ginificient Productions.

The 50 minute performance, entitled Time, told the hard-hitting story of a group of friends and a family torn apart due to a fatal road traffic

accident that killed a 14-year-old boy called Jacob.

Based on true events, the play tackles teenage pedestrian deaths on our roads by demonstrating how easily we can be distracted and how a single moment in time, a single error, can have the most devastating effects.

Organiser Miss Murphy said: "Time was a hard-hitting tale that sends out a very important message. Our Year 9s enjoyed the performance."
